- Historic Revolutionary War sites in New Jersey provided a crossroads between the big cities of New York and Philadelphia, of which the Americans and the British wanted control.
- New Jersey had many natural resources, such as iron, and good farmland to provide food for soldiers.
- The Declaration of Independence, various key battles, and alliances changed the course of the Revolutionary War and led to American victory.

Content

Students will be able to:

- list the events that led up to the American Revolutionary War
- identify New Jersey's role in the events leading up to the Revolutionary War
- analyze the Declaration of Independence to explain the principles and arguments which founded American democracy
- discuss how New Jersey's geography made it the crucial crossroads of the war
- compare the differing perspectives of Patriots, Sons of Liberty, and Loyalists
- recognize the significance of historic Revolutionary War sites in New Jersey
- explain the importance of preserving historic sites of New Jersey to connect to past history
- recognize the contributions of important figures during the American Revolution (ex: Thomas Jefferson, George Washington, Paul Revere, Molly Pitcher)
- explain the symbolic meaning of the national flag as related to the American Revolution (Stars and Stripes)
- explain New Jersey's new status as a state in an independent nation as opposed to a colony
