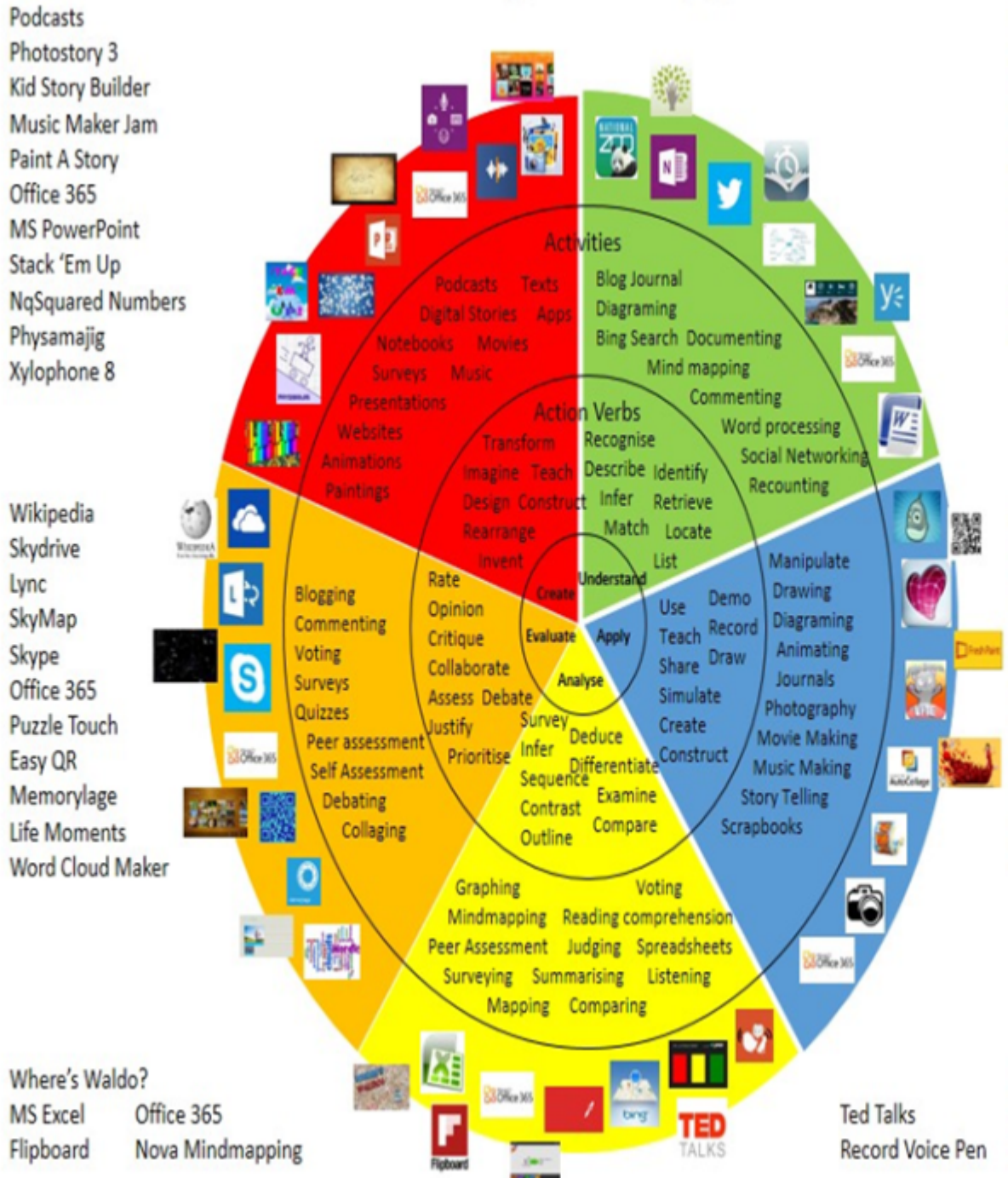
Electronic Measuring Tape-Students will use the measuring tape in order to execute perfect measurements
