## **Unit Overview**

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### **Unit Overview:**

- To provide opportunities for study and reflection of how films of the blockbuster genre are designed to bring in large audiences
- To introduce students to the "business" side of filmmaking, including film franchise
- To introduce students to teacher-screened content of the "Hard-R" genre

## **Enduring Understanding**

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### **Enduring understandings:**

- How the revenue and worldwide appeal of blockbuster films serve as the foundation of the broader filmmaking industry
- How motion pictures employ blockbuster elements, including set pieces, stock characters and archetypal heroes

## **Essential Questions**

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**Essential Questions are:**

- Why are blockbuster films so vital to the survival of the motion picture industry?
- How does a film's "quadrant appeal" relate to its overall revenue, artistic merit, thematic content and overall likelihood of financial success?


## Learning Objectives

existing trends in filmmaking and to anticipate likelihood of success and failure of future projects

- Enhance semester-long attempt to "read" a film, focusing closely on how a film with minimal dialogue, limited plot and relatively stock characters can still manage to boast worldwide appeal
- Demonstrate mastery of particular stylistic and filmmaking techniques studied in this unit
- Introduce students to teacher-screened content of the "Hard-R" genre - both to serve as a counterpoint to the wider-appeal of films contained in Unit 3, and to provide the appropriate background context for the adult themes and language that students will encounter in Unit 4

### **Suggested Activities & Best Practices**

**Student Centered Learning:** Students should either have already selected groups or groups of their choosing and we ready to jigsaw or answer higher order thinking discussion questions related to the theme or topic of the piece of literature being discussed.

**Use of Rubrics:** After discussing an assignment, allow students to create what they believe to be a fair rubric for assessing the assignment. This allows the students to have a say in how they will be graded as well as accountability for the assignment.

**Starting classes with a "Do Now" activity:** Using a connection to life question that relates to the piece of literature will make the students be able to connect to the text and jump start to discussion. "What makes a film a blockbuster?"

**Allowing students to choose their own projects:** Having a variety of projects that the students can choose from helps address all learning types. This will allow the students to choose the project they feel they can be most successful in completing.

**Brainstorming:** This helps in the writing process because it will allow the student to know if they are grasping the topic.


