### **Unit Overview**

---

The theme for this unit is Career Awareness. Students will explore career choices within the Sports and Entertainment industries, in addition to realizing related professional organizations and development within franchises and venues. Students will also explore and simulate Entrepreneurship, where they will develop innovations, design company logos, brands, packaging and social media platforms of their own, with related promotional plans utilizing Sports and Entertainment. The Entrepreneurship unit will also emphasize the critical personal attributes, workplace skills, human and financial resources required to bring a product or service to market.

### **Enduring Understanding**

---

- Entrepreneurship is a process by which we utilize problem solving and innovation skills to form a profitable business.
- Students should, throughout their lifetime be cognizant of career choices available to them within the fields of Sports and Entertainment.
- Students will be readily aware of professional organizations and educational opportunities available to them in aspiring to a career within Sports and Entertainment Marketing.
- Students will have the ability to research and secure resources required to start a business and to market a product/service.

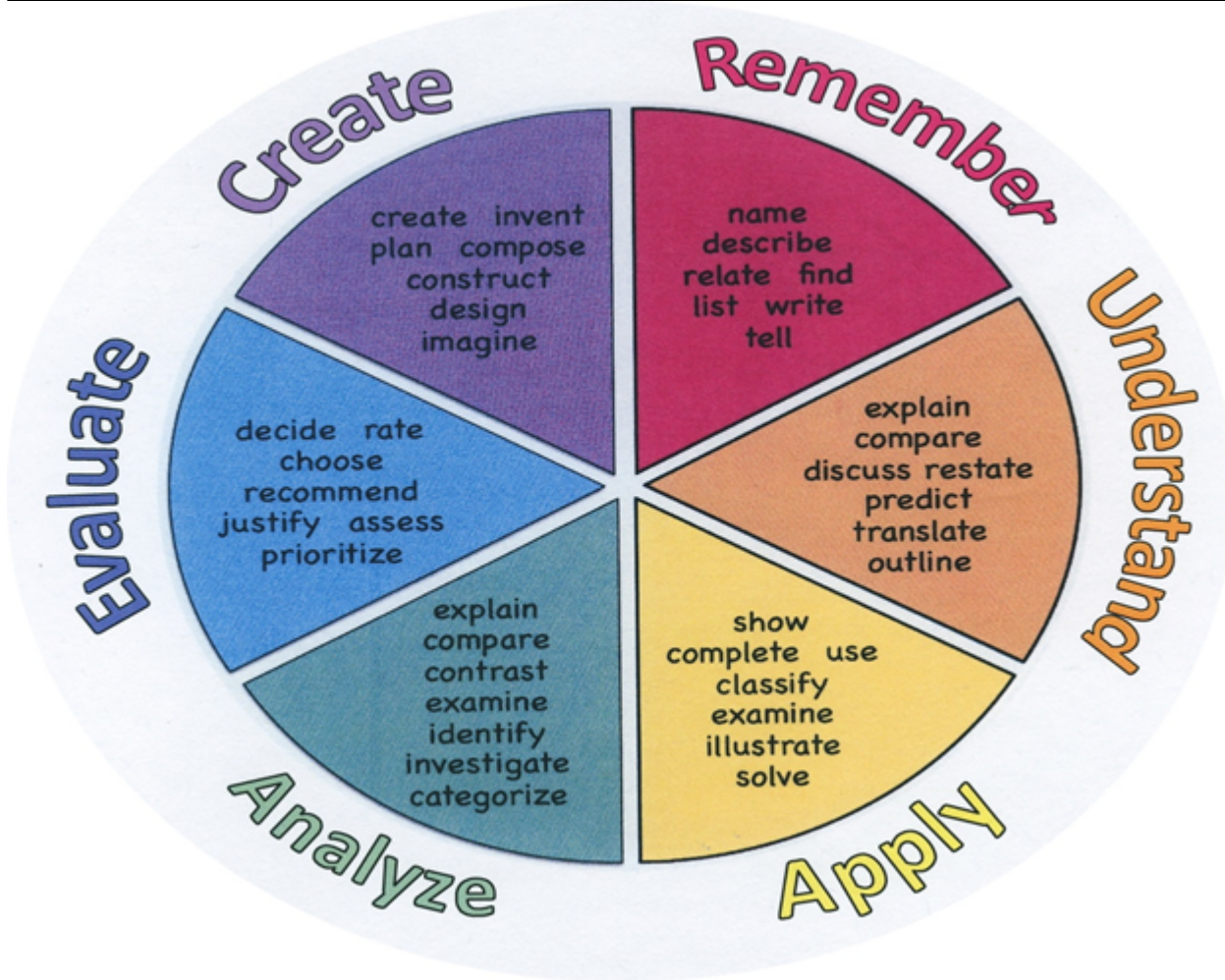
