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Unit Overview

Unit 2 describes the geography of North America and South America and its influences on society in the past, present, and into the future. This unit explains how by examining the geography within each of the two continents, you can examine what life was like and how life is today.

Enduring Understanding

The enduring understandings for this unit include:

- The people and culture of the United States are very diverse and while many in the United States are descended from European immigrants, the United States is home to people of many ethnic groups.
- Influenced by Olmec civilization, the Maya developed an advanced civilization that thrived

in Mesoamerica from about 250 a.d. until the 900's.

- After many smaller civilizations rose and fell, the Incas controlled a huge empire in South America, but it was conquered by the Spanish.
- South America is a continent made up of diverse physical features, wildlife, climates, and resources.

Essential Questions

Essential questions for Unit 2 are:

- Why does where you live in the United States matter?
- Which early Latin American civilization was most successful?
- Why is it important for the United States and Mexico to be good neighbors?
- What are the most important challenges for the nations of Central America and the Caribbean?

After completing Unit 2 on North and South America, students will be able to:

- describe the major physical features of the United States and their effects on different parts of the country.

- explain how the early civilizations in the Latin America region were impacted by the geography of the area.
- analyze the role of the physical geography of South America and the results of the geography on culture.
