Unit Overview

Students will create and maintain a website focusing on educational videos, articles, and worksheets. Along with the creation of the website students will have the knowledge to be able to make the website eye appealing and follow proper website creation techniques such as the navigation process on the website. Students will understand proper steps to update website while keeping records of website history in the dashboard. Students will have the knowledge to name and describe personnel and their function for a studio production. Students will follow steps to explain how a basic script format is created through guidelines and from watching previous tutorial videos. Students will follow guidelines to complete and create a storyboard for tutorial videos. Students will be able to begin outline for educational gaming creation that will begin in the next unit.




