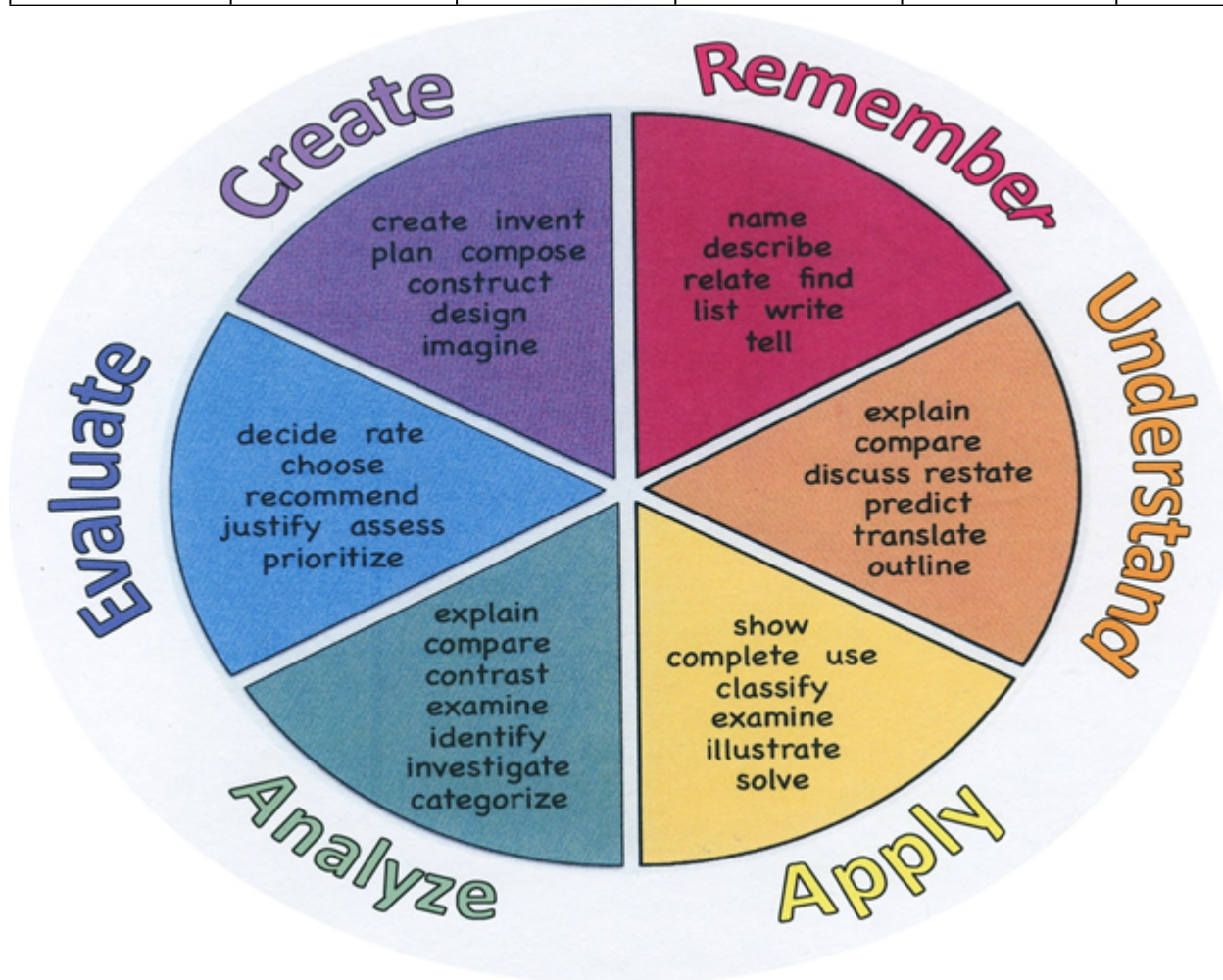

Suggested Activities & Best Practices

PLAN

- Take an hour to get organized each week. Then, try to set up a time each day when you stop (even for 10 minutes) and organize yearbook. Do this EVERY day! Make it your system.
- Open and completely unpack your Yearbook kit. Put everything where you can find it when you need it. Be organized from the start.
- If you haven't already, get your staff organized. Appoint the leaders (editors) and get them leading. Don't become the editor yourself. You are the ADVISER not the editor or a staffer!
- Finalize your [ladder](#). Verify your [deadlines and ship date](#). Make sure it all works with your school calendar. If not, call your rep.
 - See the [Making a Ladder article](#) and [The Page Ladder 7-Minute Starter](#) for detailed tips.
 - Have a purpose for every spread (no blank pages, and nothing listed as "candid" or "photo collage").
 - Decide which pages will be submitted each deadline.
 - Assign pages to students.
 - Look at school calendar for events to cover and vacations that interfere with deadlines.
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- Get portrait CD from photographer (usually within 1–2 weeks after retakes).
- Mail portrait CD to Jostens using the mailer provided in your yearbook kit at least three weeks before your deadline so we can upload it. (This to-do for Yearbook Avenue created-books only.) See the [Creating Portrait Pages](#) post for detailed tips.
- [Upload student list](#) including (in separate columns) student first and last name, grade, student ID number, homeroom, address and parent email to Yearbook Avenue.
- Train staff on journalism basics: caption writing, photography, layout by using the [Start Right in 7-Week Units or 7-Minute Starters](#).

SELL

- Make sure e-commerce is activated so you can sell yearbooks online. Talk to your rep.
- Conduct yearbook advertising push and first sales push during registration day if possible or 1st/2nd week of school at latest.
- [Enter in-school yearbook sales](#) into Yearbook Avenue.
- Set your Parent/Personal Ad sales plans. Prepare a mailer and get it out soon. Plan to do these ads on your second or third deadline.
- Choose or design your cover and endsheets if it has not been done.

CREATE

- Take LOTS of photos and upload them.
 - Yearbook Avenue Page Designer schools, upload to the [Image Library](#). Find detailed instructions on the Image Library in the [Image Library post](#).

CELEBRATE

- Do lots of [team building activities](#).
- Plan your yearbook distribution. Survey your student body to find out how they want to receive the books this fall. Their ideas can help you plan a successful distribution event. Get more ideas in the [Distribution 7-Minute Starter](#).
