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Unit Overview

This unit is about producing a 40 minute talk radio show. This talk show will be taking place live on the air. Students should expect to learn how to write a script (organization), when to implement the stations call letters, production format, and how to take a caller on the air. Students will be broken down into two groups based upon class size and format alternating shows.

Enduring Understanding

- Producing a radio talk show is an intricate process that requires much planning and organizational skills.
- Students need to use all air time during production and not have dead time on air.
- What considerations need to be explored in producing a successful talk show?
- What types of professional questions should be used during a live show?

Essential Questions

How long should the show last?

Do commercials need to be in the audio production?

What is the importance of time management?

When will the sports segment air?

How do we patch in a caller on the air?

When are requests taken over the phone?

When will the weather segment go live on air?

Exit Skills

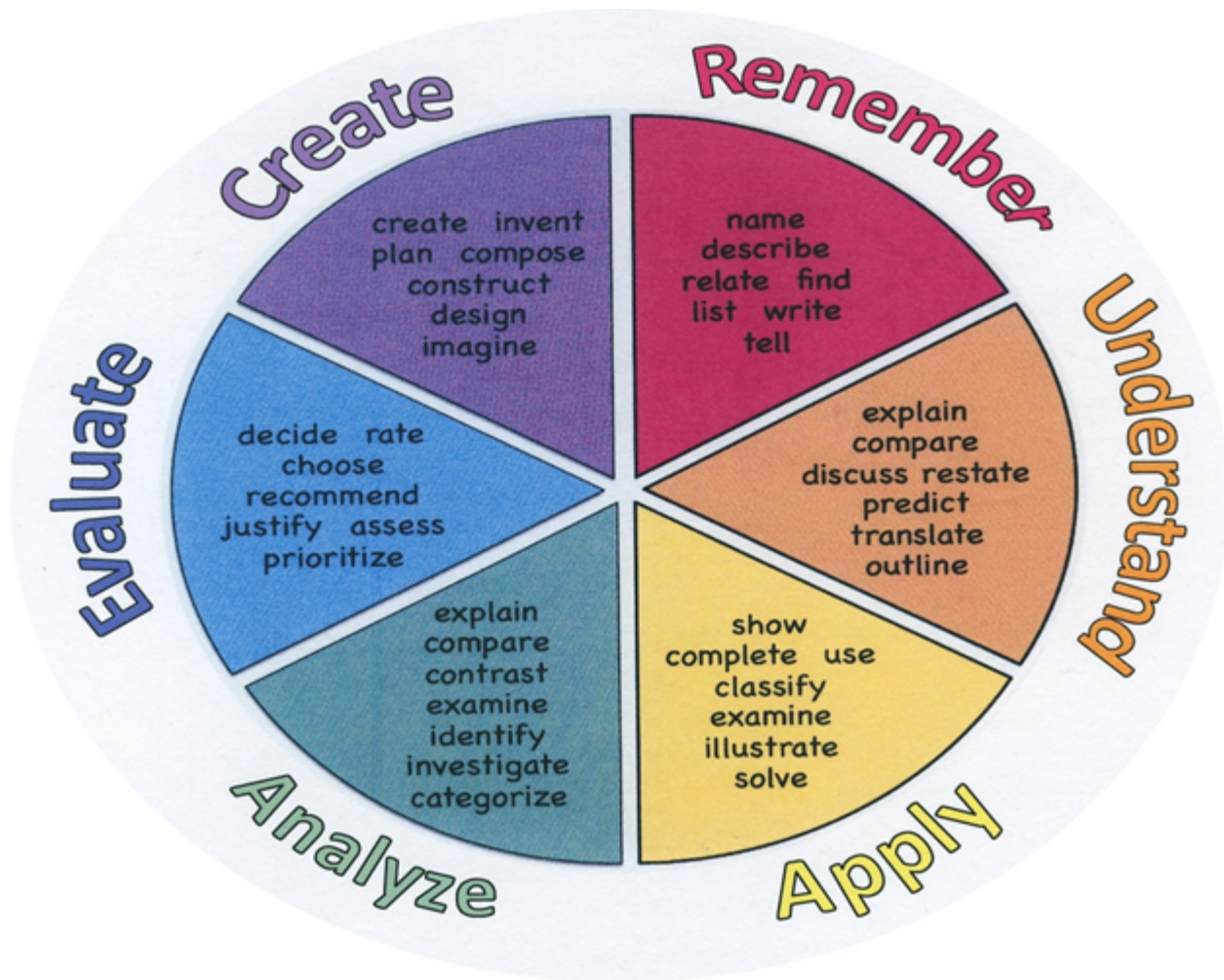

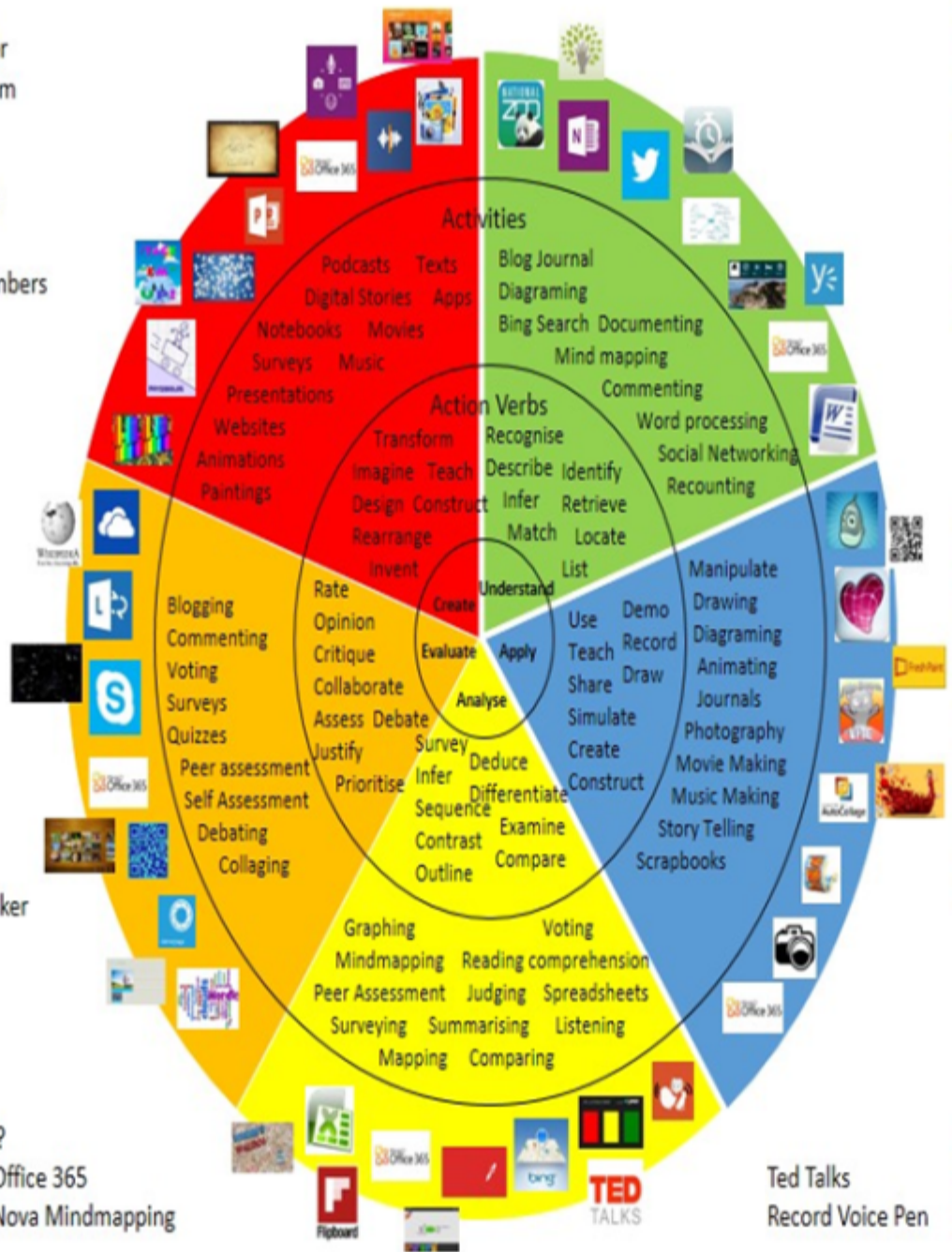
