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Unit Overview

Unit 4: The Art of Interviewing introduces students to interviewing, including how to choose sources, develop questions and conduct the interview. The unit discusses the importance of interviewing and how to choose the right sources; defines the three types of unnamed sources; and explains how to treat information from unnamed sources. The unit describes the various types of interviews and how a journalist conducts a success and powerful interview. In addition, the unit will uncover the effect of interviews on society and how choosing the right questions can produce a powerful piece of written work.

Enduring Understanding

1. An interview is the fundamental form of gathering information in journalism.
2. Skillful interviewing is a psychological and social process.
3. Interview skills are used not only for fact-gathering but also as a means of clarifying assignments and responsibilities.
4. Researching and reporting exercise the use of factual information and narrative writing.
5. The free press has the right and responsibility to report the truth to the community it serves.

Essential Questions

- How is the truth discovered and verified?
- How is information gained in interviewing used in reporting the news?
- How does a reporter prepare for an interview?
- What kind of questions should be included and excluded from an interview?
- What public speaking skills and note-taking skills are necessary for successful interviewing?
- What type of interview stories exist?
