Unit 5: The Democratic Process/Preforming Arts

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Unit Overview

This unit begins with an introduction to what group discussions should be and how to resolve conflict. From there, the features of various forms of debate are covered, as well as how to prepare for an oral interpretation of a piece of literature.

In this unit, students should expect to learn:

- What the definition of a group discussion is, and how to plan one
- How to resolve conflicts in discussions
- How to reach group decisions by decree, voting or consensus
- How to evaluate a discussion
- The specialized features of debate, including the three kinds of propositions and debate formats
- How to prepare to debate by discovering issues and organizing proof
- The responsibilities of the affirmative and negative sides in constructive speeches
- What is meant by refutation and rebuttal
- What the criteria are for judging a debate
- What is meant by oral interpretation
- How to analyze literature to determine meaning and mood
- How to prepare/present an oral interpretation of a piece of literature
- How to participate in reader's theater

Enduring Understanding

- 1. A speaker's oral interpretation may add to the dramatic impact of a piece of writing.
- 2. A speaker's word choice may affect an audience's reaction to a speech.
- 3. The efficacy of a speaker affects the impact and clarity of a speech's overall message; Ineffective delivery of a speech may render the speech's content meaningless.

Essential Questions

- 1. What makes a speech unforgettable?
- 2. How may a speaker best connect with an audience?
- 3. How may a speaker improve vocally, physically, and verbally?
- 4. What criteria should one use to evaluate a speech?
- 5. Why is self-evaluation important?
- 6. What makes a speaker genuine?
- 7. What motivates an audience?
- 8. How may a student incorporate public speaking skills into all classes and future endeavors?

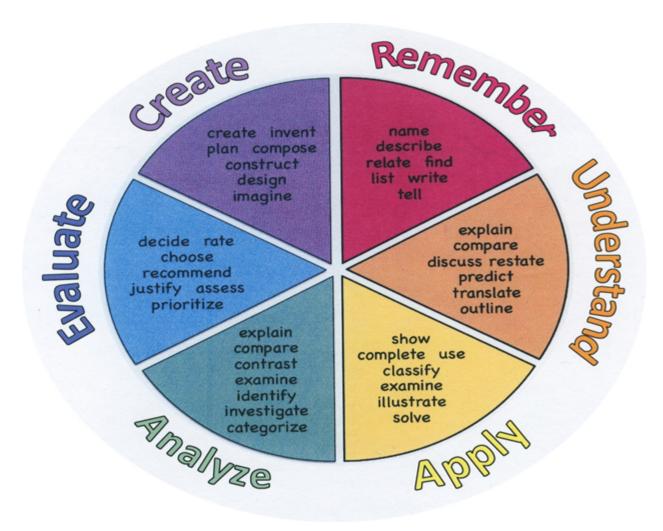


