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Unit Overview

Unit 5 - Story Comprehension & Reenacting

The students will comprehend what they read, infer meanings of unfamiliar vocabulary, and identify various parts of speech to promote more sophisticated writing and conversation in [target language] by:

- Rewriting sentences and paragraphs substituting different tenses, moods, pronouns, etc.;
- Speak about given scenarios accurately using the correct tenses and moods;
- Read & identify various parts of speech in articles & stories

Enduring Understanding

Students will understand that:

- Language learning involves acquiring strategies to fill communication gaps.
- Comparing English with others languages is important to understanding the nature of language and

their cultures.

- Understanding of a text's features, structures, and characteristics facilitate the reader's ability to make meaning of the text.
- Readers use language structure and context clues to identify the intended meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text.

Essential Questions

Students will keep considering:

- How do I develop communicative competence?
- When does accuracy matter?
- How do I figure out a word I do not know?
- Why can one not translate directly from English to Target Language/ Target Language to English?
- How does understanding a text's structure help me better understand its meaning?

- Conjugate verbs in all moods & tenses.
- Interpret a story and how to identify its different components.
- Write and present a short story or script with proper pronunciation, intonation, and emotion.

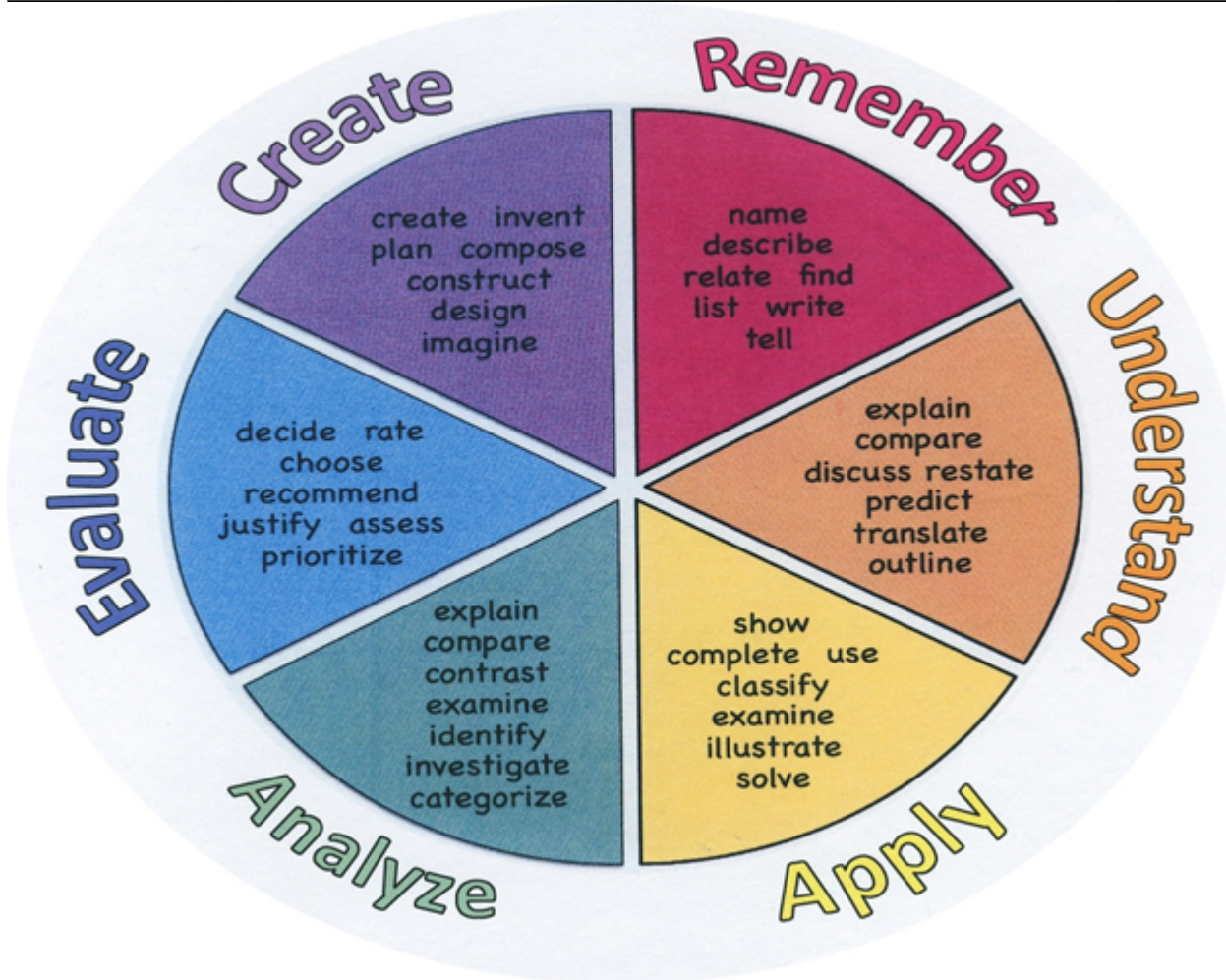

 - allowing products (projects, timelines, demonstrations, models, drawings, dioramas, poster boards, charts, graphs, slide shows, videos, etc.) to demonstrate student's learning
 - allowing students to select from given choices
 - allowing the use of note cards or open-book during testing
 - collaborating (general education teacher and specialist) to modify vocabulary, omit or modify items to reflect objectives for the student, eliminate sections of the test, and determine how the grade will be determined prior to giving the test.
 - decreasing the amount of work presented or required
 - having peers take notes or providing a copy of the teacher's notes
 - marking students' correct and acceptable work, not the mistakes
 - modifying tests to reflect selected objectives
 - providing study guides
 - reducing or omitting lengthy outside reading assignments
 - reducing the number of answer choices on a multiple choice test
 - tutoring by peers
 - using authentic assessments with real-life problem-solving
 - using true/false, matching, or fill in the blank tests in lieu of essay tests
 - using videos, illustrations, pictures, and drawings to explain or clarify
