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## **Unit Overview**

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Unit 3: Deciding What's News focuses on how news is developed and produced by editors and journalists who understand its qualities and elements. Students will explore the elements of a news story and the difference between hard and soft news stories. The unit will include the various types of news stories, how to distinguish them from one another and each of their significance. The unit will also include the elements of a news story, how to research for news articles, the importance of choosing sources, and how certain stories impact different people of diverse cultural backgrounds. Students will learn news judgment and other factors that influence news choice.

## **Enduring Understanding**

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1. Analyzing text is important in order to understand the writer's tone and purpose.
2. Understanding the role of journalists helps in identifying their impact on society.
3. Conducting critical analyses of print, radio, television and digital media creates well-rounded and informed citizens.

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- How can you define news?
- Where do journalists find the news?

- What elements make a story newsworthy?
- How does a journalist distinguish between acceptable and unacceptable sources?
- Why are sources important to write an effective story?
- How is the truth discovered and verified?

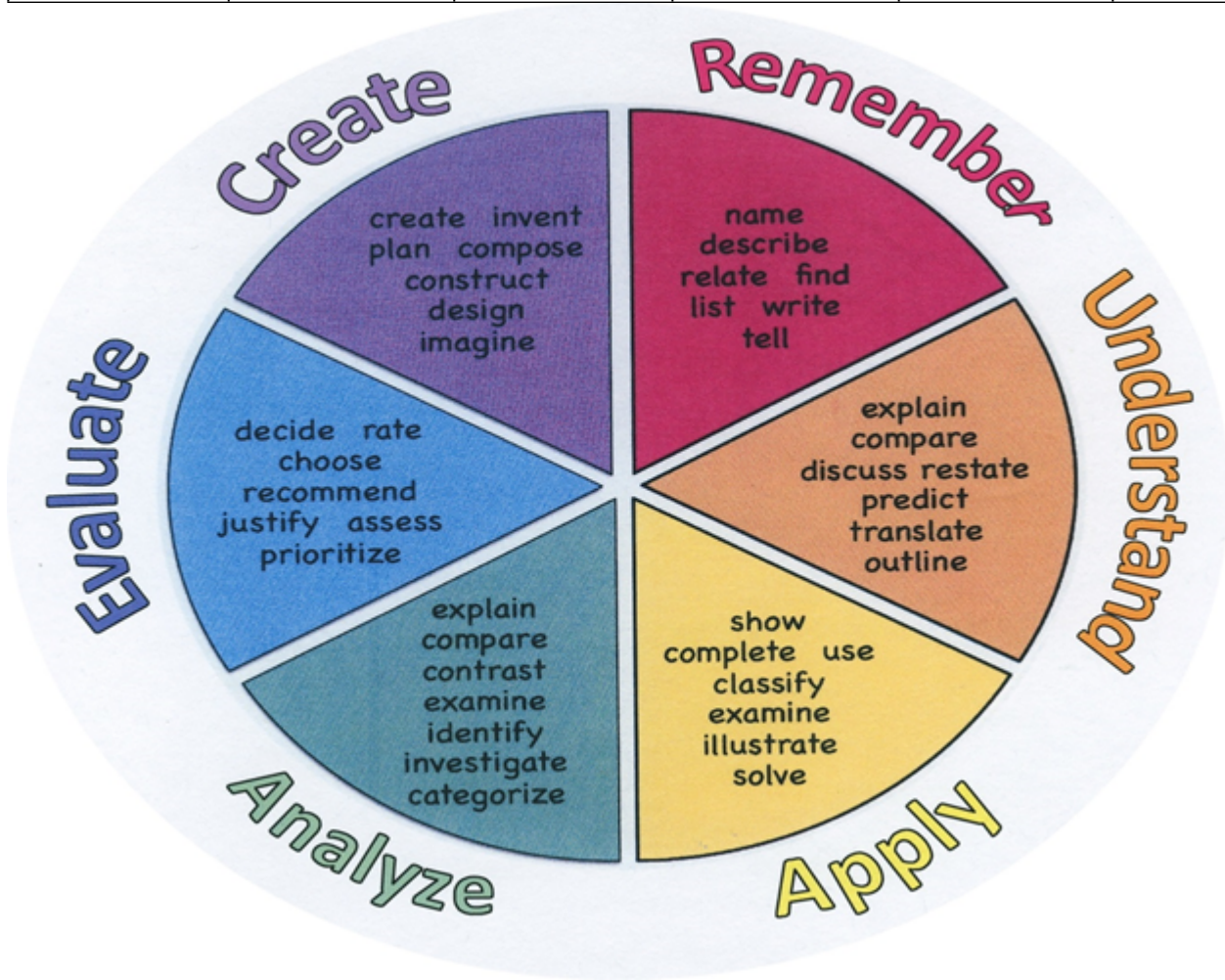
