Unit Overview

The theme for this unit is accounting for assets including Accounts Receivable, Depreciation and Inventory. Emphasis is placed on accounting for "uncollective" accounts receivable, plant assets and related depreciation, concepts and practices related to inventory management and valuation and the process of writing off an account

Enduring Understanding

- Understand financial risk involved in "on account" purchases for a business.
- Identify accounting processes involved in estimating, recording and writing off uncollectibles.
- Relate adjustments for uncollectible accounts to the Matching principal (matching revenue to expense)
- Ability to transfer principals of depreciation and book value to personal valuation of assets through their lives
- Apply concepts of inventory management to both, business and personal matters

Essential Questions

- What methods can be used to estimate an allowance for uncollectibles?
- What transactions are required to journalize uncollectibe expense?
- How is Accounts Receivable affected by uncollectibles?
- Should a business reopen a customer account after it has paid an uncollectible?
- When cash is paid for equipment, what accounts are affected?
- What is real property?
- How is assessed value of plant assets calculated?
- When depreciation is recorded, which accounting concept is applied?
- How do we calculate a gain or loss on the sale of a plant asset?
- What are two methods utilized to depreciate assets?


