Brief Summary of Unit

Unit 2: Review Composition

This unit will focus on reviewing and deepening students' understanding of photographic composition. Students will revisit key compositional elements and principles to improve the effectiveness of their images. By exploring concepts like the rule of thirds, leading lines, framing, symmetry, and the use of negative space, students will refine their technical and creative abilities to compose visually compelling photographs. The unit will encourage critical analysis of images, self-reflection, and peer feedback.

Essential Questions

- How do compositional techniques influence the way an image is perceived by an audience?
- In what ways can the rule of thirds and other compositional principles enhance the storytelling aspect of photography?
- How can a photographer use composition to evoke specific emotions or reactions in their viewers?
- What role does experimentation with composition play in developing a unique photographic style?

Essential Understandings

- Composition is the fundamental tool that elevates the meaning and emotional impact of a photograph.
- Understanding compositional techniques allows photographers to visually communicate their intended message or narrative more effectively.
- The relationship between the subject, environment, and visual elements determines the quality of an image.

Students Will Know

- The core compositional techniques, including the rule of thirds, leading lines, framing, symmetry, and negative space.
- How to identify and apply various compositional principles in their own work.
- How to critique their own and others' photographs based on compositional elements.
- The importance of adjusting compositional elements to improve the aesthetic and narrative impact of an image.

Learning Plan

- Preview and discuss the essential questions as a class.
- Review key photography composition techniques through teacher-led presentations and visual examples:
 - o Rule of Thirds
 - Leading Lines
 - o Framing
 - Symmetry and Balance
 - Depth and Layering
 - o Perspective/Point of View
- Group discussions to analyze professional photographs that exemplify these techniques.
- Quick formative quiz or interactive game (e.g., Kahoot or visual ID challenge) to reinforce terminology and concepts.
- Students complete a series of photography-based exercises designed to isolate and practice each composition technique.
- Stations or prompts set up around the school/room to allow students to explore different approaches to composition.
 - Example exercises: "Find symmetry in architecture," "Use natural framing with foliage," or
 "Create a dynamic leading line using shadows."
- Students upload and organize their best 2–3 shots per technique into a digital folder or shared class platform.
- Begin peer critiques: small-group feedback sessions focusing on identifying and discussing compositional strategies used.

- Students form small groups to plan and execute a collaborative photo shoot focusing on at least three different compositional techniques.
- Simultaneously, students work independently to create a personal mini-series (3–5 photos) that explore a specific theme using strong compositional elements.

Suggested Activities:

Interactive Review & Terminology Reinforcement

- Group discussion analyzing professional photographs that demonstrate composition techniques.
- Quick formative quiz or interactive game (e.g., Kahoot or visual ID challenge) to reinforce terms and concepts.

Composition Practice Stations

- Students rotate through stations/prompts around the school or classroom designed to isolate and practice specific composition techniques (e.g., find symmetry in architecture, use natural framing, create leading lines with shadows).
- Students capture photos and upload their best 2–3 shots per technique to a shared digital platform.

Peer Critique and Collaborative Planning

- Small-group peer critiques focusing on identifying and discussing compositional strategies in student photos.
- Groups plan and prepare a collaborative photo shoot incorporating at least three different composition techniques.

Execution of Collaborative & Personal Projects

- Students complete their group photo shoots applying planned compositional strategies.
- Independently, students develop a personal mini-series (3–5 photos) exploring a theme with strong compositional elements, preparing work for presentation and reflection.

Evidence/Performance Tasks

Fine Arts students demonstrate differentiated proficiency according to their ability to answer the essential questions through formative and summative assessments. Evidence of progression may be demonstrated in divergent ways through the Artistic Process of Creating, Presenting/Producing, Connecting, and Responding.

Tasks will include:

Preview/Answer essential questions

- Meaningfully and appropriately participate in class critique and discussions
- Complete class projects including weekly critique assignments
- Complete self-assessment rubrics
- Participate in assessment discussions with teacher
- Complete final exam
