Students will develop the skills to properly clean and care for their instruments. Properly maintained instruments contribute to student's success in instrumental music.

Essential Questions

- How does maintaining an instrument negatively and/or positively impact the sound and tone that is produced by that instrument?
- Under what condition does an instrument produce the best sound and tone?
- Why is maintaining an instrument important to the overall sound of the ensemble?

Essential Understandings

- • a well maintained instrument can produce a rich and full sound.
- • a well maintained instrument facilitates easier playing and better intonation.
- a well maintained instrument will contribute to their overall sound of the ensemble.

Students Will Know

- how to recognize when their instrument needs repair.
- proper instrument maintenance for their respective instrument.
- when to attempt a repair and when to bring the instrument to the teacher or professional.

Students Will Be Skilled At

Evidence/Performance Tasks

- answer the essential questions.
- • demonstrate proper instrument maintenance during their weekly lessons and continue throughout the course.

Learning Plan

- Assessment of instrument maintenance by the student by their ability to perform the following skills: cleaning the wood parts of the instrument with a cloth, tightening and loosening the hair of the bow, rosining the bow, proper storage of the instrument, polishing, straightening of a leaning bridge, resetting a fallen bridge, fixing a loose fitting or sticking peg (level III)
- • Introduction to string changing, tightening and loosening the hair of the bow (level II)
- Preview the essential questions and connect to learning throughout the unit.
- Proper assembling of accessories, cleaning, storage, rosining the bow, and polishing. Cellists: taking bow out of the case first (level I)
