The focus of this unit is for students to learn how to act with the whole body and learn that physicality is an integral part of creating a believable character.

Essential Questions/Enduring Understandings

- What is stage movement and how does it affect character?
- What are the ways to create natural movement on stage?
- How can outer influences such as music change movement on stage?
- How can movement and mime help characterization?
- What are the different ways in which we can manipulate the body to create shape on stage?

Objectives

- Students will know how to improve the physicalization of character through stage movement.
- Students will know how to determine stage rhythm in a scene.
- Students will be skilled at applying movement techniques to a character.
- Students will know how to analyze and manipulate the different parts of the body in order to change their shape to better articulate character.

- Students will be skilled at defining character traits, such as age, through movement.
- Students will be skilled at conveying truthful emotion through facial expressions.
- Students will know how to utilize props in natural movement.

Learning Plan

- Provide various movement exercises to be included as a daily regimen in class and at home.
- Work with actors to create simple but diverse movements through various exercises.
- Work with isolation techniques in slow motion to create living statues to discover the nuance of movement.
- Have students work on developing realistic mime technique and have them perform various pantomimes.
- Work with students on scenes to gain knowledge of rhythm.
- Listen to and discuss various music styles and compare rhythm, tempo, and musical builds to movement on stage.
- Have students perform short scenes that combine music and mime to create simple nonverbal scenes.
- Have students pick an actor or famous character and attempt to change their physical qualities to match their subject.

Assessments

- Students will brainstorm about the essential questions through regular written reflections in the Actor's Journal.
- Students will demonstrate understanding by participating in various movement games and exercises.
- Students will identify and define basic mime movements.
- Students will perform pantomime scenes that have basic stories.
- Students will develop living statues to create short narratives.
- Students will participate in exercises using musical recordings when building rhythm in a scene.
- Students will perform impersonations of famous actors in order to practice changing physical quality.
- Students will monitor individual progress and reflect upon performances.
