Brief Summary of Unit

In this unit, students will master the foundational tools and non-destructive workflows of Adobe Photoshop, the industry standard for digital imaging and photo editing. Through guided demonstrations and hands-on projects, students will learn to efficiently build and refine complex digital artwork using layers, selection tools, masking, and color adjustments. By applying these techniques to solve creative design challenges, students will develop technical precision and a strong understanding of visual communication. Ultimately, this unit provides a robust foundation in digital manipulation, preparing students for real-world applications in graphic design, photography, advertising, and digital media production.

Essential Questions/Enduring Understandings

Essential Questions:

- How has Adobe Photoshop transformed the fields of graphic design, photography, advertising, and digital media production?
- In what ways has Photoshop changed how designers and photographers create, edit, and communicate visual content?
- Why are many professional photographs edited or enhanced before being published online or in print media?
- How do photo editing and digital manipulation improve the quality, effectiveness, and communication of visual imagery?
- What ethical responsibilities do designers and photographers have when altering images digitally?
- How has Photoshop influenced society's perception of beauty, reality, advertising, and social media?
- What positive and negative social impacts have resulted from the widespread use of digital image manipulation?
- How can Photoshop be used both creatively and responsibly in professional design and media industries?
- In what ways does digital editing blur the line between reality and artistic interpretation?
- How do designers use Photoshop tools to create visual storytelling, solve creative challenges, and communicate ideas effectively?
- How does the integration of artificial intelligence and generative art in Photoshop impact the authenticity of digital media and the role of the designer?

Enduring Understandings:

- Adobe Photoshop has had a transformative impact on the graphic design industry by revolutionizing the way designers create, edit, and manipulate digital imagery. It has become one of the most widely used and influential tools in visual communication, allowing designers to produce professional-quality work for advertising, photography, web design, social media, film, and print media. Photoshop has expanded creative possibilities by giving artists and designers the ability to combine images, enhance visual storytelling, and develop highly polished digital compositions with precision and efficiency.
- Photoshop is considered an essential industry-standard tool for students pursuing careers in graphic design, photography, marketing, digital media, and related creative fields. However, Photoshop is far more than simply a program used to enhance or “glamorize” photographs. It is a powerful creative platform used for image compositing, digital illustration, branding, visual effects, retouching, typography integration, and conceptual design. Professional designers use Photoshop to solve visual communication challenges, create engaging media content, and communicate ideas effectively across a wide range of industries and digital platforms.
- Understanding Photoshop allows students to develop both technical and creative problem-solving skills while gaining insight into how digital imagery influences communication, advertising, entertainment, and modern culture.

Objectives

Students Will Know:

- The wide range of applications and creative uses of Adobe Photoshop within the fields of graphic design, photography, advertising, digital media, marketing, and visual communication. Students will develop an understanding of how Photoshop is used professionally for photo editing, image compositing, digital illustration, branding, special effects, and multimedia production.
- The foundational functions and tools of Adobe Photoshop, including selections, layers, masks, adjustments, filters, transformations, retouching tools, and blending techniques. Students will learn how these tools work together to create professional-quality digital artwork and visually effective compositions.
- How to render and manipulate digital images through techniques such as color correction, image enhancement, compositing, masking, and visual effects. Students will explore how designers and

photographers use rendering and editing processes to improve image quality, create realistic visual scenes, and communicate ideas more effectively through digital media.

- How to work efficiently and professionally within the Photoshop workspace by developing organized workflows, understanding file management, utilizing keyboard shortcuts, and applying non-destructive editing techniques. Students will learn strategies that improve productivity, accuracy, and overall effectiveness while working on complex digital design projects.
- How professional designers use Photoshop as both a technical and creative problem-solving tool to transform ideas into engaging visual communication across print and digital platforms.

Students Will Be Skilled At:

- Fundamental Photoshop functions and workflows, including how to effectively work with layers to organize and build complex digital compositions. Students will learn how to create, duplicate, lock, unlock, hide, delete, rename, and rearrange layers within the Layers panel while understanding the importance of non-destructive editing techniques in professional digital design. Instruction will also introduce students to layer styles and effects, including shadows, glows, overlays, and blending options used to enhance visual communication and add depth to digital artwork.
- The use of Photoshop's selection tools and an understanding of when and why each tool is most effective within the editing process. Students will explore the Marquee Selection tools, Lasso tools, Magic Wand, Quick Selection Tool, and the Pen Tool as a precision selection method. Emphasis will be placed on accuracy, efficiency, and selecting appropriate tools based on image complexity, edge quality, and desired editing outcomes.
- Techniques for modifying and manipulating selected areas of an image, including copying, moving, transforming, rotating, resizing, recoloring, deleting, lightening, darkening, and adjusting transparency levels. Students will learn how selective editing allows designers to control composition, emphasis, visual hierarchy, and realism within digital artwork.
- An introduction to the primary tools within the Photoshop toolbar and their practical applications in digital imaging and design. Students will gain hands-on experience using tools such as the Burn and Dodge tools for tonal adjustments, the Eraser tool for image editing, the Brush tool and its customizable edge qualities for painting and retouching, the Type Tool for typography integration, the Move Tool for composition adjustments, transformation and scaling tools, the Crop Tool for image framing, and foreground/background color controls for painting and editing. Additional instruction will include the use of rulers, guides, workspace organization, and keyboard shortcuts that improve workflow efficiency and professional productivity.
- Creating realistic and visually cohesive imagery through the combination and compositing of multiple images. Students will learn how to blend photographs, adjust lighting and color consistency, refine edges, and manipulate scale and perspective in order to create believable and visually effective digital scenes. Emphasis will be placed on understanding how professional designers and digital artists use compositing techniques to create conceptual imagery, advertisements, and photo manipulations.
- Managing digital files and understanding the purpose of different file formats used in graphic design and digital media production. Students will learn how to properly save, export, and organize files in formats such as PSD, JPEG, and PDF while understanding the advantages, limitations, and professional uses of each file type in both print and digital workflows.
- Understanding pixel dimensions, image resolution, aspect ratios, and file sizes in relation to digital design and media production. Students will examine how image quality, resolution, and document setup affect the final outcome of print and screen-based projects. Instruction will also address the importance of optimizing file sizes for efficient storage, sharing, and professional production standards.

- Editing and utilizing images sourced from the internet while discussing ethical considerations, copyright awareness, and responsible digital media practices. Students will learn how to properly incorporate external imagery into design projects while understanding the importance of image quality, attribution, and legal considerations in professional creative work.
- Developing efficient workflow habits and technical problem-solving skills within Photoshop through guided practice, experimentation, and creative application. Students will strengthen their ability to navigate the program confidently while applying industry-standard digital editing techniques to a variety of visual communication projects.

Learning Plan

- Introduce and review the unit's essential questions, encouraging students to make connections between digital imaging, visual communication, and creative problem-solving throughout the course of the unit. Discussions will focus on how Adobe Photoshop is used professionally in graphic design, photography, advertising, entertainment, and digital media production.
- Teacher-led daily demonstrations introducing the tools, workspace, and functions of Adobe Photoshop through interactive instruction using the classroom whiteboard and projected software demonstrations. Students will explore the purpose and application of Photoshop tools while developing an understanding of professional digital editing workflows and design techniques.
- During each instructional presentation, students will complete guided notes and handout activities designed to reinforce technical vocabulary, software navigation, and key digital imaging concepts. Students will maintain organized reference materials that can be used throughout the unit as they develop their technical proficiency.
- The instructor will introduce a focused series of Photoshop tools and features each day, gradually building student understanding and confidence with the software. Daily instruction will include demonstrations of selection tools, brushes, transforms, retouching tools, masking, blending modes, filters, adjustments, layer management, and image manipulation techniques. Following demonstrations, students will be provided structured exploration time to practice and experiment with the tools independently and at their own pace.
- Each class session will begin with a brief review of previously introduced tools and concepts before progressing to new material. These review activities will reinforce skill retention, strengthen technical understanding, and encourage students to apply previously learned techniques within new design scenarios.
- Throughout instruction, students will participate in guided, step-by-step exercises alongside the instructor. These exercises will focus on understanding the functions of layers, layer styles, adjustment layers, selections, masking, and the features available within Photoshop's top menu bar. Emphasis will be placed on non-destructive editing techniques, organization of digital files, and efficient workflow practices commonly used in professional design environments.
- Collaborative class activities and discussions will support problem-solving and creative experimentation using Photoshop tools and techniques. Students will analyze how digital editing choices affect composition, realism, visual impact, and communication within a design.
- As a class, students will participate in an extended guided project lasting approximately one to two weeks in which they collaboratively create a digital scene using the Photoshop skills and tools introduced throughout the unit. This structured, step-by-step process will allow students to apply and

reinforce their understanding of selections, layers, blending, transformations, effects, and compositing techniques within a realistic design scenario. The project will demonstrate how individual Photoshop tools work together to create cohesive and visually effective digital artwork.

- Following the guided class project, students will independently create their own original digital scene from concept to completion. Students will be encouraged to apply as many Photoshop tools and techniques as possible while demonstrating creativity, technical proficiency, and effective visual communication. Emphasis will be placed on experimentation, problem-solving, and the ability to independently utilize digital editing tools within a professional design process.
- During project development, students will engage in peer discussions and collaborative critiques in which they explain their editing processes, demonstrate how they achieved specific manipulations and effects, and reflect on areas of strength and opportunities for improvement within their work. These discussions will encourage the use of professional design vocabulary while strengthening critical thinking and communication skills.
- The unit will include a variety of creative and technical projects designed to develop student understanding of digital image manipulation and visual storytelling. Projects may include, but are not limited to:
 - CD or Album Jacket Design
 - Movie Poster Design
 - Visual Pun Compositions
 - Facial Manipulation and Retouching
 - Greeting Card Design
 - Impossible Scenario Compositions
 - Space and Environment Creation
 - Cross-Animal Manipulation and Hybrid Creatures
- These projects will provide students with opportunities to apply Photoshop techniques in increasingly complex and creative ways while exploring composition, typography, color correction, image blending, photo realism, and conceptual design.
- Ongoing teacher facilitation, individualized instruction, and technical support will be provided throughout the unit to address varying student ability levels and encourage both artistic growth and mastery of industry-standard digital imaging software.
- Student work will be evaluated through teacher assessment, peer critique, and student self-assessment using rubrics aligned with unit objectives, creativity, craftsmanship, technical skill development, and effectiveness of visual communication.

Assessment

Formative

Students will be evaluated through daily exit tickets, quizzes on design principles and Adobe Illustrator, and participation in guided discussions. Additionally, they will engage in peer critiques and instructor conferences to refine their logo concepts and demonstrate their overall understanding.

Summative

Design and create a comprehensive digital portfolio piece accompanied by an artist statement detailing the Photoshop techniques (layers, masks, blending modes) utilized in the final composition.

Alternative Assessment

Present the project to peers and/or the community.

Complete writing prompt: Complete writing prompt: Analyze a professional advertising campaign and write a critique detailing the likely digital manipulation techniques used and the ethical implications of the final image.

Materials

 - Instructional reference sheets and design process organizers to support brainstorming, sketching, concept development, and project planning.

Instructional Accommodations

- Provide step-by-step written and visual instructions for all design projects and software demonstrations.
- Break larger assignments into smaller, manageable tasks with interim deadlines and check-ins.
- Use modeling and teacher demonstrations before independent student work.
- Provide guided notes, vocabulary lists, and graphic organizers for lectures and presentations.
- Offer repeated directions and clarify expectations verbally and visually.

- Pre-teach key vocabulary related to graphic design, Adobe Illustrator/Photoshop tools, and design principles.
- Allow students to access recorded demonstrations or tutorial videos for review at their own pace.
- Provide exemplars and sample projects to reinforce expectations and concepts.
