

Unit 04: Becoming a Responsible Library Citizen

Brief Summary of Unit

Kindergarten students will understand that libraries provide a diverse collection of materials and there are responsible ways to take care of these materials.

This unit is designed to be part of a developmental progression across grade levels and make interdisciplinary connections across content areas including physical and social sciences, technology, career readiness, cultural awareness, and global citizenship. During this course, students are provided with opportunities to develop skills that pertain to a variety of careers.

Essential Questions

- How can I become an effective user of the library media center?
- How can we take care of library books so everyone can enjoy them?
- What can I do to keep books safe and clean?
- What should I do if a library book gets damaged?
- Why are patrons responsible for any materials they borrow from a library?
- Why does a library media centers provide a diverse collection of materials to its patrons?
- Why is it important to demonstrate good library citizenship?
- Why is it important to take care of books?

Students Will Know/Student Will Be Skilled At

- To ask assistance from the media specialist if they find a book needs repair.
- A bookmark is used instead of folding pages.
- Answering the essential questions.
- Borrowing and returning library resources appropriately.
- Demonstrating and describing proper ways to care for materials and books.
- Describe the types of materials that can be found in a library media center.
- Food and drinks can damage books. Most of the books returned damaged are from water bottle leaks.
- Taking care of books helps everyone enjoy reading.
- There are many types of materials that can be found in a library media center.
- There are responsible ways to care for books and materials that are borrowed from a library media center.
- There are right and wrong ways to treat books.
- Understand that everyone shares and cares for library books.

Evidence/Performance Tasks

Students demonstrate differentiated proficiency through both formative and summative assessments in the classroom. Based on individual student readiness and performance, assessments can be implemented as formative and/or summative.

Developmental progression across years in media is evidenced through benchmark assessments as part of the media specialist's Student Growth Objective (SGO). Follow up diagnostic assessments are used to target skill remediation. Student proficiency allows for additional or alternative assessment based on demonstration or absence of skill.

The performance tasks listed below are examples of the types of assessments teachers may use in the classroom and the data collected by the district to track student progress.

- Benchmark/Alternative-Students can identify whether a picture shows good or poor book care.
- Benchmark/Alternative-Students will create a bookmark showing proper book care rules.
- Formative-Students can explain one way to keep books safe.
- Formative-Students will identify good and poor book care.
- Formative-Students will identify good and poor book care.
- Formative-Students will return materials on a regular basis.
- Formative-Students will self-assess their performance.
- Formative-Students will use books in a proper manner.
- Formative-Through discussion, students will describe the various materials that can be found in a library media center.
- Summative-Students can demonstrate how to hold a book correctly, turning one page at a time carefully, and
- Summative-Students can role play appropriate library citizenship based on skills related to acceptable ways to take care of library materials.
- Summative-Students can say one book care rule.

Learning Plan

Media Specialist may personalize instruction during this unit and address the distinct learning needs, interests, aspirations, or cultural backgrounds of individual students.

Media Specialists at the elementary level design their own unique lesson plans in order to incorporate the essential questions provided in this unit. The order in which this information is presented is dependent upon the variables specific to each elementary school community. For example, students may be called to the carpet for a lesson followed by guided practice, then independent practice. After the lesson, students will check out books. Library Media time ends with an electronic story so that the media specialist can assist and model proper checkout procedures with students.

Kindergarten students will understand that libraries provide a diverse collection of materials and there are responsible ways to take care of these materials. Lessons will focus on book care and proper use of technology devices. Suggested activities are listed below for this unit:

- Create a bookmark to encourage proper book care.
- Introduce key vocabulary: book care, bookmark, spine, bookshelf, book cart, patron, and technology devices.
- Mini lesson may include: proper book care using examples of mistreated books, demonstrating proper handling skills for print (e.g., how to open and hold properly, turn pages correctly, using bookmarks, and returning materials to proper place), demonstrating proper handling of technology devices.

- Model proper handling skills for print (e.g., how to open and hold properly, turn pages correctly, use bookmarks, and return materials to proper place).
- Preview the essential questions and connect to learning throughout the unit..
- Read relevant fiction and nonfiction books.

Materials

The materials used in this course allow for integration of a variety of instructional, enrichment, and intervention materials that support student learners at all levels in the school and home environments. Week 1-Book Care Don't Let the Pigeon Touch the Books! Watch a YouTube video of Don't Let the Pigeon Touch the Books. Read Don't Let the Pigeon Ruin the Books. Review Book Care. Review Makerspace center rules. Role play how to pick a book and checkout in the library. Students check out for the first time.

Week 2-Book Care Review how to take care of our books. Watch Ryan & Craig Read Aloud of a Perfectly Messed Up Story. Talk about the #1 cause of Book Loss at Walnut is leaking water bottles in backpacks.. Talk about water damage to books (Watch YouTube Book Care Commercial on Water Damage about water bottles leaking)

Week 3- Finding a safe place to keep our library book.- Read Maybe a Bear Ate It-finding a safe spot at home to keep our library books so we can return library books back to school.

Week 4- Why we need to return library books- Read Book Hog.
