## **Enduring Understandings**

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- There are many realms of theatrical design such as scenic, lighting, costume, sound, and projections
- The design process begins with rough sketches and concept drawings and culminates in the creation of the actual items to be used
- Scripts have characters, dialogue, stage directions and punctuation specific to the stage
- Actors, designers, directors, and dramaturgs can all glean different information from the same text

## **Students Will Know/ Students Will be Skilled At**

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Students will know:

- The structure of a theatrical production team
- The design process
- Playwriting structure
- What dramaturgy is and what role a dramaturg plays

Students will be skilled at:

- Creating rudimentary designs of different elements of a production
- Analyzing scripts for historical context, production value, budget limitations, and design concepts
- Writing scripts utilizing proper format that any theater artist could easily understand

## **Learning Plan**

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- Discuss essential questions
- Discuss elements of design
- Experience examples of design in media such as film and television
- Bring in examples of design the students find interesting or simply like
- Discuss the design process
- Create a design concept in collaboration with a small group for The Wizard of Oz
- Discuss scripts and their formatting
- Review written text and analyze it from a different perspective or production team job
- Present notes from the text from these different perspectives/jobs
- Adapt a short scene from a novel to the stage using proper formatting

## **Evidence/ Performance Tasks**
