Instructional Strategies

- age-appropriate videos and books, parent/guardian communication through phone calls
- behavior plans/contracts, positive reinforcement, self-assessments
- Individual and group counseling, mediation and problem-solving with students,
- meetings and e-mails, collaboration with teachers and administrators
- reflective discussions
- role-playing, didactic questioning, games (teaching students to play by the rules)
- school-wide assemblies and classroom lessons
