Unit Overview

This unit is about making decisions with regards to choosing a home, home expenses, furnishing an apartment and living as independently as possible.

- forecast the types of essential furnishings they will need in a room, an apartment and/or a house.

- Students will be able to independently assess and determine the type of living expenses that they will incur as an independent adult living within the community.
- Students will be able to live successfully with a roomate or partner.
