Understandings

Students will understand that...

- -You must be respectful to the reader or presenter during class.
- -Always use a shelf marker while choosing a library book.

They must follow procedure for searching for a book.

- -Renew books following the correct procedure.
- -If your book is overdue, you may not be able to borrow a new book.
- -You are responsible for taking care of library materials in your possession.

- -There are a variety of resources available in the library (books, magazines, audio books, etc.)
- -Bring the book you have selected to the circulation desk for checkout with the online library management system (i.e., Destiny).
- -A call number is the address for a library book. It tells in which section the book can be found.
- -The call number is shown in the online card catalog (Destiny) and will tell them exactly where they can find the book.
- -The main sections of the school library are Fiction, Non-Fiction, Biography, and Reference. Each section has its own organizational system.
- -Fiction books are arranged alphabetically by the author's last name.
- -Nonfiction books are arranged numerically according to the Dewey Decimal System.


