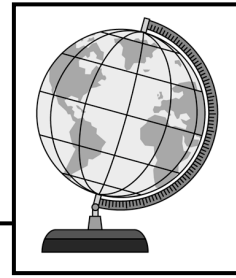


Where in The World...?
