Unit 1: Keyboard Basics

Unit Overview

In this unit, the students will acquire the basic knowledge and skills in order to begin playing piano. These keyboard basics will include an introduction to the keyboard layout, use and care of the instrument, how to sit at the keyboard, hand position, and developing good habits for practice and performance. Students will be able to identify and interpret basic musical nomenclature and theory essential for music reading.

- -Develop basic piano technique.
- -Develop good practice habits.
- -Identify the notes and organization of black and white notes on the keyboard.
- -Identify elements of music theory essential for music reading.

Understandings

Students will understand that...

- -Piano technique and posture will affect piano performance.
- -Good practice habits will enhance piano skills and performance abilities.
- -The keyboard is organized in a specific pattern of whole steps and half steps.
- -Pitches are assigned to lines and spaces on the Grand Staff that correspond to notes on the piano keyboard.
- -Notes are assigned a duration of time or note value.

Essential Questions

- -How will posture and hand position affect piano performance?
- -What are the elements of good practice habits?
- -How will effective practice enhance performance abilities?
- -How are the notes of a piano keyboard organized?
- -How does the Grand Staff and pitch notation correlate to the laybout of the piano keyboard?

- -The elements of good practice.
- -Use and care of the instrument.
- -The importance of good posture and hand position.
- -The notated Grand Staff, including the Staff, Treble Clef, Bass Clef, Middle C, and their corresponding location on the keyboard.
- -How to read and interpret basic note values.

- -Demonstrating good posture at the keyboard.
- -Demonstrating correct hand position.
- -Demonstrating proper use and care of the instrument.
- -Demonstrating the pattern and organization of notes on the piano keyboard.
- -Identifying and being able to write the symbols for indication of sharp, flat, and natural pitches.
- -Identifying and being able to write both Treble and Bass Clefs, and the pitches notated on them.
- -Locating and playing the pitches notated on the Grand Staff.
- -Identifying and writing basic note values, including quarter notes, half notes, dotted half notes, and whole notes.
