- Students will work in small groups to conduct research on the pattern of urban growth for a large city in their state. Then using current and historic maps, students will create a model of urban growth that employs one or more of the three models of city structure and urban growth.
- Students will write a paper on the effect of urbanization on American institutions.

- Students will write a profile on an organization dealing with the effects of modernization.
- Students will write and interpret their own urban legend.
