Course Overview

Sequence- Unit Titles, Summaries, and Number of weeks per unit (total = 18 semester/36 year)

Unit I- Foundations of American Democracy (5 weeks)

 This unit introduces students to the philosophies that influenced the Framers of the Constitution. Important Constitutional concepts are analyzed and students evaluate the balance of power in American politics.

Unit II- Interactions Among Branches of Government (8 weeks)

 Students learn about the three co-equal branches of government and how each branch can cooperate and compete with the others. The policy making process and the means in which the branches are held accountable is also a focus.

Unit III- Civil Liberties and Civil Rights (8 weeks)

Students examine the rights and liberties guaranteed by the Constitution and the limitations
of those rights. Landmark Supreme Court cases are studied, as well as important social and
political movements.

Unit IV- American Ideologies and Beliefs (5 weeks)

Students evaluate the process by which people's political identities are formed, as well as
examining the pillars of American political culture. Students have an opportunity to exam
how political opinions are measured and how they can change overtime.

Unit V- Political Participation (5 weeks)

 This unit examines the linkage institutions (media, parties, special interest groups) that connect the American people with our government. Students are able to assess how these institutions impact elections and policy making.

Unit VI- Exam Review (2 weeks)

o Students review essential material and prepare for the end of course exam.

Unit VII- Political Satire (5 weeks)

o The unit allows students to apply their knowledge of freedom of speech and ideology to examine satire. Students then create their own satire and present them to the class.
