Rationale & Transfer Goals

Learners will take a look at a calendar and understand how to use one. Students will share family traditions and make connections with others.

Enduring Understandings

Students will be able to understand national holidays and the people and events honored on these special days.

Essential Questions

- What kinds of special events does your family celebrate? How do you celebrate these events?
- Do you know someone in our community that is a hero? What did this person do to be a hero?
- Does your family display a calendar or use a calendar on a smartphone or computer? What events do they put on the calendar? How do you use a calendar?
- What is one tradition your family has? What food is a tradition that your family prepares for a certain holiday?

Intersections of History

The experiences of individuals of varying races, cultures, religions and orientations have shaped our world. This section will build upon students' knowledge of different holidays and traditions. They will explore specific groups and their customs by reading books and learning about individuals. Students will develop and build upon global awareness through current and past events.

Black: Students will read many pieces of literature about Martin Luther King Jr and discover the importance of celebrating the positive impact he made on our country. Students will see the impact of standing up for what is right and how they are capable of doing the same thing to help fight injustices.

Hispanic: Students will read Our Favorite Day of the Year by A. E. Ali and learn about a group of students and the different ways they celebrate holidays. Students will recognize the diverse classroom in the story and see the significance of learning about friend's cultures.

Women: Students will read the story She Persisted by Chelsea Clinton and learn that she was the first woman to run for president of the United States. Young girls will see that they are also capable of doing the same thing.

LGBTQ: Students will understand that we celebrate different groups during different months. Black History is celebrated in February. Hispanic History in October. Women's History in March and Pride Month in June.
