Rationale/Goals

This sixth-grade unit explores the ancient civilizations of the Hebrews, Egypt, and India to help students understand how geography, culture, religion, government, and innovation shaped the development of early societies. Students will examine the unique characteristics and achievements of each civilization while recognizing the connections between them. Through the study of the origins of Judaism and Hinduism, the accomplishments of ancient Egyptians, and the development of the Indus Valley and later Indian civilizations, students will gain an appreciation for the lasting influence these civilizations have had on law, religion, government, technology, and culture. The unit encourages students to think critically about how the past has shaped the world we live in today.

Essential Questions: Main Essential Question
