Rationale/Goals

In this unit, students will explore the rise, expansion, and fall of the Roman Empire while examining its lasting influence on the modern world. Students will investigate Roman government, law, engineering, technology, language, religion, trade, and social structure to understand how geography, innovation, and leadership shaped one of history's greatest civilizations. They will also compare Roman government and legal systems to those of the United States, recognizing the enduring influence of the Roman Republic and Roman law on American democracy and civic life.
