Rationale/Goals

Students will examine how Europe changed after the fall of the Roman Empire by exploring the rise and decline of feudalism, the influence of geography, religion, trade, and government, and the lasting impact of medieval institutions on the modern world. Through the analysis of maps, primary sources, graphic organizers, and historical evidence, students will strengthen their critical thinking, reading, writing, and communication skills while making connections between medieval Europe and contemporary society. Mastery of the unit will be demonstrated through assessments that measure content knowledge, historical thinking, geographic

understanding, and evidence-based writing.
