Rationale/Goals

This unit introduces students to the rich history, cultures, and achievements of the great civilizations of West Africa. Students will explore the rise and development of the empires of Ghana, Mali, and Songhai, examining how geography, trade, leadership, and cultural exchange contributed to their success. The unit also highlights the importance of African traditions, including oral history, religion, family life, art, music, and storytelling, helping students develop a deeper appreciation for the diversity and complexity of African societies.

Through the study of historical figures such as Sundiata Keita and Mansa Musa, students will analyze how leadership and innovation shaped powerful kingdoms and influenced regions far beyond Africa. They will investigate the role of the trans-Saharan trade routes, the spread of Islam, and the importance of cities such as Timbuktu as centers of learning and commerce.

This unit encourages students to challenge common misconceptions about Africa by recognizing its long history of sophisticated governments, thriving economies, and vibrant cultural traditions. By examining primary and secondary sources, maps, artifacts, and historical accounts, students will strengthen their historical thinking skills while making connections between the past and the modern world.

- How did leadership, trade, and cultural exchange contribute to the success of West African civilizations?
- What evidence demonstrates that West African civilizations made significant contributions to world history?
- How do the achievements and traditions of ancient African civilizations continue to influence the modern world?

- Students will be able to explain how the geography of West Africa influenced the development of the Ghana Empire by examining the importance of the Sahel region, Sahara Desert, and Niger River in supporting settlement, agriculture, and trade.

- Students will be able to evaluate how leadership, trade, and cultural exchange helped the Mali Empire become one of Africa's most powerful civilizations.

Topic 14 Lesson 3: Songhai

- Students will be able to explain how the Songhai Empire rose to power by examining its location along the Niger River and its control of important trade cities such as Gao and Timbuktu.
- Students will be able to describe how trade and natural resources contributed to Songhai's growth by explaining the importance of gold, salt, and trans-Saharan trade routes.
- Students will be able to analyze the leadership of Sunni Ali and Askia Muhammad by explaining how

their military strategies, government reforms, and policies helped strengthen the empire.

- Students will be able to explain how Islam influenced Songhai society by examining its impact on education, government, trade, and culture.
- Students will be able to describe the importance of Timbuktu as a center of learning and scholarship and explain its role in preserving knowledge and ideas.
- Students will be able to evaluate the factors that led to the decline of the Songhai Empire by analyzing the effects of internal challenges and outside conflicts.
- Students will be able to explain how leadership, trade, and cultural exchange contributed to Songhai becoming one of the largest and most powerful empires in West Africa.
