- Why did many Americans believe a stronger national government was necessary?
- Why did the United States replace the Articles of Confederation with the Constitution?
- How did the Constitution address the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation?

- Why was the Constitutional Convention called?
- How did delegates resolve disagreements over representation and slavery?
- How did the framers attempt to create a government that balanced power while protecting the interests of different states?

Topic 4 Lesson 1: A Weak Confederation

- I can explain why the Articles of Confederation created a weak national government by analyzing its strengths and weaknesses and examining the challenges faced by the new nation because understanding the failures of the Articles helps explain why the United States needed a stronger government.
- I can compare and contrast the Articles of Confederation and the Constitution by identifying how each divided powers between the national and state governments because comparing both systems helps explain how the Constitution created a stronger and more effective government.
- I can explain how Shays' Rebellion influenced the writing of the Constitution by examining primary and secondary sources because historical events often reveal weaknesses in governments and lead to important changes.

Topic 4 Lesson 2: Drafting a Constitution

- I can explain how the Virginia Plan and the New Jersey Plan influenced the structure of Congress by comparing each proposal and using evidence from the Constitutional Convention because compromise is essential when creating a government that represents different interests.
- I can explain how the Great Compromise and the Three-Fifths Compromise helped create the Constitution by analyzing the debates and agreements reached at the Constitutional Convention because compromise allowed the states to unite under one government.
- I can explain how the Constitution divides and limits government power by examining the three branches of government, separation of powers, and checks and balances because limiting power helps protect democracy and individual freedoms.

Topic 4 Lesson 4: Federalists, Antifederalists, and the Bill of Rights

- I can compare the arguments of the Federalists and Anti-Federalists by analyzing their beliefs about the

Constitution because understanding different perspectives helps explain how democratic decisions are made.

- I can explain why the Bill of Rights was added to the Constitution by examining the concerns of Anti-Federalists and the protections guaranteed by the first ten amendments because individual rights are essential to a democratic government.
- I can evaluate how compromise influenced the ratification of the Constitution by using evidence from historical documents because successful governments often require negotiation and compromise.

Topic 4 Lesson 5: Understanding the Constitution

- I can explain the principles of the Constitution by analyzing examples of popular sovereignty, republicanism, federalism, limited government, rule of law, separation of powers, checks and balances, and individual rights because these principles continue to guide the United States government today.
- I can evaluate how the Constitution balances power and protects citizens by examining the responsibilities of each branch of government because balancing power helps prevent any one branch from becoming too powerful.

Topic 4 Lesson 6: Federalism and Amendments

- I can explain how federalism divides powers between the national and state governments by examining delegated, reserved, and concurrent powers because sharing power allows governments to meet both national and local needs.
- I can explain how the amendment process allows the Constitution to change over time by analyzing examples of constitutional amendments because governments must adapt to meet the changing needs of society while protecting citizens' rights.
- I can explain the responsibilities of citizens, political parties, interest groups, and the media by examining their roles in American democracy because active civic participation helps strengthen democratic government.

Topic 5 Lesson 1: Washington's Presidency

- I can explain how George Washington established precedents for future presidents by examining the creation of the executive branch and the first Cabinet because the decisions of early leaders shaped the role of the presidency.
- I can evaluate Alexander Hamilton's financial plan by analyzing the National Bank, national debt, tariffs, and taxation because economic policies influence the strength and stability of a nation.
- I can explain how the Whiskey Rebellion, Judiciary Act of 1789, and Northwest Ordinance strengthened the new government by examining their impact on the Early Republic because the federal government needed to demonstrate its ability to enforce laws and organize the nation.
- I can evaluate George Washington's leadership by using evidence from his presidency, including the Farewell Address, because his decisions established traditions that continue to influence the American government.

Topic 5 Lesson 3: Presidents Adams and Jefferson

- I can explain how political parties developed by comparing the beliefs of the Federalists and Democratic-Republicans because differing views about government continue to shape American politics today.
- I can evaluate the Alien and Sedition Acts by examining their impact on constitutional rights and civil liberties because governments must balance national security with individual freedoms.
- I can explain how Thomas Jefferson expanded the United States by analyzing the Louisiana Purchase and the Lewis and Clark Expedition because territorial expansion changed the nation's economy, geography, and future growth.
- I can evaluate the leadership of John Adams and Thomas Jefferson by using historical evidence to determine how their decisions helped shape the federal government because the actions of early presidents influenced the future of the United States.

Topic 5 Lesson 4: A Changing Nation

- I can explain how westward expansion changed the United States by analyzing the effects of the Louisiana Purchase and exploration of new territories because territorial growth created new opportunities and challenges for the nation.
- I can evaluate whether the early administrations fulfilled the goals and principles of the Constitution by analyzing evidence from the presidencies of Washington, Adams, and Jefferson because evaluating historical leadership helps us understand how governments develop over time.
- I can make connections between the Early Republic and modern American government by comparing the decisions of early leaders with issues facing the United States today because understanding the past helps citizens make informed decisions about the present and future.
