- How did the War of 1812 influence America's national identity and relationships with other countries?
- How did Monroe's presidency and the idea of national growth shape the United States during the Era of Good Feelings?
- Why did tensions between the United States and Great Britain lead to the War of 1812?
- How did the outcomes of the War of 1812 influence American nationalism and identity?
- How did America's relationship with other nations change after the War of 1812?
- How did the Monroe Doctrine change America's role in world affairs?
- Why did Americans begin moving west during the early 1800s?
