- Expanding vocabulary enhances students' ability to understand and express complex ideas. It also improves their reading comprehension and ability to follow and participate in discussions.
- Understanding figurative language and word meanings within context enhances comprehension and appreciation of literature. It also helps students develop a nuanced understanding of language.
- Emphasizes the importance of vocabulary knowledge in understanding informational texts. It supports students' ability to grasp content-specific terms, aiding in their overall academic achievement.
