Americans must meet certain requirements in order to vote. Read the list to learn who is eligible, or qualified, to vote. Then read the descriptions of four people. Decide whether or not the law allows them to vote, and explain why or why not.

Voting Requirements in the United States

- A voter must be at least 18 years old.
- A voter must be a U.S. citizen. Anyone born in the United States is a citizen. People born in other countries who are living legally in the U.S. can apply for U.S. citizenship. They must pass a test to show that they have a basic knowledge of U.S. history.
- A voter must be a legal resident of the state in which he or she votes.


