General Overview, Course Description or Course Philosophy

The First Grade American Figures Unit is designed to provide learners with the knowledge, skills and perspective needed to identify American Figures and explain their meaning in relationship to America. Lessons are aligned with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards and will infuse technology and ELA within projects, activities, and written products.

- National symbols are a proud representation of patriotism.

- How did these American figures impact America?
- How does understanding the past help us understand the present?

- Identify prominent United States landmarks such as: White House, Ellis Island, Mount Rushmore, etc.
- Explain the historical significance behind United States landmarks.
- Recall facts about United States symbols such as: Liberty Bell, Statue of Liberty, Bald Eagle and The Flag.
- Establish a connection between the symbols and history.
