General Overview, Course Description or Course Philosophy

This course provides a solid foundation in Choir fundamentals, which are introduced, reviewed and mastered, from grade level 6 through level 8. Its design is to impart students with a multifaceted music education, through skill building, historical and social contexts, and performance. Students will engage in daily collaborative whole group and small group singing, to enhance vocal technique, while building community and equity through diversity. Musical growth and mastery will be demonstratvie at two choir concerts, one marking their mid-year progress, the second culminating in their end of year proficiency.

OBJECTIVES, ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS, ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

Choral Intonation is the pitch accuracy of a group of singers. It is what makes a choir sound "in tune."

The vibrations of tone are in direct relation to a choir's DICTION, particularly the uniform production of VOWEL formations.

STUDENT LEARNING TARGETS

Declarative Knowledge

Students will understand that:

- Diction affects the intonation of choir.
- Choir members must produce the same vowels in the same way.
- Careful attention to vowel formation during warm-ups will elimate poor intonation.
- Fricatives and stop-plosive consonants, affect the purity of the vowel.

Procedural Knowledge

Students will be able to:

- Perform warm-ups with unified diction, to ensure a good intonation for rehearsal.
- Identify which phonemes within the lyrics of a song are distorting the choir's intonation, and adjust to fix the ensemble's sound.
- Assess whether the choir is tuned correctly, by actively listening (aural awareness) while singing.
