04_Unit 4: Pregnancy, Childbirth, Adoption, and Abortion

General Overview, Course Description or Course Philosophy

This course is designed to empower students by providing learning experiences that encourage and foster conscious and healthy decision making, involving relationships, sexuality, family planning, and more. This course includes discussions of abstinence and helps to develop attitudes, values and skills that are essential in making responsible decisions regarding sexuality throughout their life. This course also features aspects of simulated parenting responsibilities throughout the marking period long baby project.

OBJECTIVES, ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS, ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

Pregnancy, Childbirth, Adoption, and Abortion - 8-10 Classes

In this unit students will build off of knowledge gained from the reproductive unit, students learn the stages of reproduction from fertilization to birth. Students will gain a deeper understanding of the labor process, procedures, and problems that can occur during labor. Students will also learn basic patterns of heredity and genetics. In addition, students will learn factual information about adoption options. Students participate in discussions of decision making and analyzing options associated with pregnancy and teen pregnancy. Students will assess the costs of independent living as well as a cost analysis relating to child care and a child's needs. Students will discuss abortions and emergency pregnancy scenarios like an ectopic pregnancy. Students will understand all types of adoption.

Enduring Understandings

- There are many decisions to be made related to pregnancy and childbirth that will have short and long-term impacts.
- Healthy individuals demonstrate the ability to identify who, when, where and/or how to seek help for oneself or others.
- Prenatal care can affect the development of the baby and the birthing process.
- Life begins with a healthy pregnancy.
- Healthy individuals demonstrate the ability to identify who, when, where and/or how to seek help for oneself or others.
- Abortions are controversial because of personal religious beliefs, morals, values, and emotions.

- What are the current recognized practices for a healthy pregnancy and birth?
- What is the NJ Safe Haven Law and why does it exist?
- What options are available to a woman facing an unwanted pregnancy?

- 10. Recognize the components of postpartum depression and examine the effects it has on the family.
- 11. Discuss sudden infant death syndrome/fetal alcohol syndrome.
- 12. Investigate the New Jersey laws pertaining to abortions, and those of surrounding states.
- 13. Identify the problems facing pregnant teens and examine options available to them.
