OBJECTIVES, ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS, ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

Unit Importance:

- It is important to understand that the academic art process requires discipline, structure, organization, academic and personal integrity. Academic and visual researches are required for authentic work. Documentation and note-taking are integral parts of the process. Academic and visual research extend the scope and breadth one's own ideas.

Essential Question(s):

- How does knowing the contexts, histories and traditions of art forms help us create works of art and design?
- How do artists determine what resources and criteria are needed to formulate artistic investigations?
- How do artists work?
- Why is it important, for safety and health, to understand and follow correct procedures in handling materials, tools and equipment?
- What responsibilities come with the freedom to create?
- How do objects, places and design shape lives and communities?
- How do artists and designers determine goals for designing or redesigning objects, places or systems?
- How do artists and designers create works of art or design that effectively communicate?
