

# Unit 1 - You Are Here

## Unit Overview

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In this introductory unit, students read to answer the essential question: "How do different places affect us?" They think about what it means to live in a community and how community members can improve their neighborhoods. Students read a variety of texts to compare different places. They practice making predictions based on close reading notes and then revise their predictions as the story progresses. As they learn about the experiences of others, they share their own stories of visiting or moving to a new place, using descriptive language in their retelling or writing to help the audience understand the place. At the end of the unit, students discuss how new places can help us to grow and change.

## Enduring Understandings
