Unit Overview

Enduring Understandings

Local community and government leaders have roles and responsibilities to provide services for their community members. Part of living in a democratic society is having a voice in the decisions that are made in government.

Essential Questions

- What are the different levels of government?
- What are some rights and responsibilities as an American citizen?
- What are the characteristics of a hero?
- Who are our heroes?
- Why is it important to stand up for the rights of others?

Learning Objectives

- Identify and understand citizen's rights and responsibilities.
- Define government and state its purpose.
- Understand the purpose of voting.
- Understand that Washington, D.C. is the capital of the United States.
- Understand the separation between national, state and local governments.
- Understand that each nation has its own separate government.
- Describe the role of a city council.
- Define and identify heroes.
- Discuss qualities of heroes.
- Define equal rights.
- Identify individuals throughout history involved in fighting for the rights of African Americans.
- Explain how women throughout history fought for equal rights.
- Identify problems faced by Native Americans.
- Identify heroes from Mount Rushmore and other local and national heroes.

Identify accomplishments of notable scientists, inventors and explorers.
 Identify ways students can help in their community.
 Determine appropriate ways to celebrate and honor heroes.
 Define stereotyping and prejudice.
 Discuss how bullying, stereotyping and prejudice hurt communities and individuals.
 Work with a group to find solutions to bullying in the local community.
