Unit 2: Early Civilizations and the Emergence of Pastoral Peoples: Ancient River Valley Civilizations

Social Studies
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Unit Overview

In this unit, ancient river valley civilizations (RVC) are explored. The 4 major RVC are Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, and China. For each of the RVC, we will examine their geography, religion, achievements, political structure, economy, and social structure (GRAPES). As we examine each RVC, we will compare and contrast their similarities and differences. Students will be able to eventually determine common factors that make up what an ancient RVC is and why they are so important to understanding the development of civilization in general.

These RVC were the first civilizations in the world. Students will investigate how these river valleys helped to support growing populations, and how these populations were then able to advance into civilizations. Students will learn through study and apply the following flow chart: agriculture, surplus, barter, division of labor, complex culture, and advanced civilization. This flow chart of activity appears in every civilization, and if any part of the flow fails, students will discover how the civilization will fall apart. Each part depends on the part before it.

Two of these RVC (India and China) will turn into classic civilizations, which is the next unit of study.
