Module 4 Overview

In Module 4:

In this module, students will listen to, read, and view a variety of texts that present them with examples of what makes someone a hero. A genre focus on fairy tales

and myths provides students with opportunities to identify text and graphic features, point of view, and themes in order to better understand unfamiliar texts.

Students will also encounter narrative nonfiction to build knowledge across genres. As students build their vocabulary and synthesize topic knowledge, they will

learn that with personal courage and confidence, people can face any challenge.
