Skills

Describe characteristics of oneself, one's family and others

Demonstrate an understanding of family roles and traditions

Express individuality and cultural diversity (through dramatic play)

Learn about and respect other cultures within the classroom and community

Describe how culture is expressed through and influenced by the behavior of people

Trace how the American identity evolved over time

Explain how an individual's beliefs, values and traditions may reflect more than one culture

Explain how experiences and events may be interpreted differently by people with different cultural or individual perspectives

Describe why it is important to understand the perspectives of other cultures in an interconnected world

Learning Targets include but not limited to:

Individuals and families have unique characteristics

There are many different cultures within the classroom and community

Cultures include traditions, popular beliefs and commonly held values, ideas and assumptions that are generally accepted by a particular group of people

American culture, based on specific traditions and values, has been influenced by the behaviors of different cultural groups living in the United States

The cultures with which an individual or group identifies, change and evolve in response to interactions with other groups and/or in response to needs and concerns

People view and interpret events differently because of the times in which they live, the experiences they have had, the perspectives held by their cultures and their individual points of view

Helpers - draw picture of how they have helped or been helped by a family member

Celebrate! - sing celebration song and share a way their family celebrates

Chart Then/Now

Alphabet Soup - draw picture that begins with an assigned letter

Modifications for Students Who Lack Support for School	Extended time, assign preferential seating, positive reinforcement, peer tutoring, study guides, lower reading

Modifications for Gifted Students	Integrate, abstract, complex and varied assignments, freedom of choice when applicable, variable pacing levels

Interdisciplinary Connections

- Academic and Technical Rigor - Projects are designed to address key learning standards identified by the school or district.
- Authenticity - Projects use a real world context (e.g., community and workplace problems) and address issues that matter to the students.
- Applied Learning - Projects engage students in solving problems calling for competencies expected in

high-performance work organizations (e.g., teamwork, problem-solving, communication, etc.).

- Active Exploration - Projects extend beyond the classroom by connecting to internships, fieldbased investigations, and community explorations.
- Adult Connections - Projects connect students with adult mentors and coaches from the wider community.
- Assessment Practices - Projects involve students in regular, performance-based exhibitions and assessments of their work; evaluation criteria reflect personal, school, and real-world standards of performance.
